## FIRE RESTRICTIONS

As summer begins and people flock to the Tahoe area for recreation, increased fire danger is always on the minds of local fire officials. The Truckee Fire Protection District has issued a ban on all wood burning campfires, except those in designated campgrounds. BBQs and firepits using gas are permitted, but any other method of fuel (charcoal/wood) is banned June through November. The North Tahoe Fire Protection District has not announced a similar ban, but is continuing its mandates on properly screened outdoor fireplaces, with limitations of total fuel area of 3 feet or less, and located at least 15 feet from any structure. All burning/grilling must be suspended on Red Flag Days. For Red Flag Day status, visit [www.weather.gov](http://www.weather.gov).

## Truckee River Rafting

Water levels on the Truckee River are still high and the water is moving swiftly, but the commercial rafting companies are planning on opening for business in early July. The local rafting companies are accepting reservations on their websites, but keep in mind that all operations are dependent on water flow and weather, and there is still a lot of winter runoff coming into the lake. Rafting season typically runs through Labor Day weekend.

## New Bike Paths

Three miles of lakefront bike path has just been completed on the East Shore of Lake Tahoe. This is an extension of the path along Lakeshore Drive in Incline Village that now continues to Sand Harbor State Park. This is a major component of the Tahoe Bikeway that will one day go all the way around the Lake. Last fall, the bike path on the west shore was extended to Meeks Bay from the previous end point at Sugar Pine Point. The west shore bike path now extends from Squaw Valley to Tahoe City, east to Dollar Hill and south to Meeks Bay Resort.

## NO WAKE ZONE

The TRPA is putting more efforts into enforcing the no wake zone that exists within 600 feet from shore around the entire Lake. The posted speed limit within 600 feet is 5mph. This regulation is in effect to protect non-motorized watercraft, counteract shoreline erosion, and to reduce collisions with underwater obstructions. Be prepared to see more enforcement of this policy from the local law enforcement on the lake, including sheriff, coast guard and the TRPA itself. If you are unfamiliar with gauging what 600 feet looks like, it is the approximate distance to shore from the outer channel markers of the marina. TRPA also has a free app you can download called "Tahoe Boating" that will alert you to no wake zones, aide in navigation and describes points of interest along the lake.
